A style of improvising and composing that did not rely on chord changes, but on varied scalepatterns (or modes) emerged under the influence of of theorist George Russel, as well as Miles Davis, Bill Evans, John Coltrane, Eric Dolphy, and later Herbie Hancock and Wayne Shorter. This style was more open, free, and eclectic in its approach.

MODAL JAZZ

Avant Garde (Free) Jazz

Contemporaneous w/ modal jazz, musicians experiment with spontaneous collective improvising, exploring the artistic limits of freedom. Influence of conterculture & Nation of Islam.

AVANT GARDE

Fusion: Influenced by rock and R & B, some jazz players tried to synthesize their rhyhtms with jazz soloing; fusion was a commercial success (briefly) but an artistic dead-end.

FUSION
